In the Orthodox Christian Home

Teaching Our Children to Be Good Stewards

One of the greatest lessons Orthodox Christian parents are called upon to teach their children is to be good stewards.

Christian stewardship means that Christianity has its own principle of economics. The capitalist, for example, believes that individuals should own the wealth of the world. Socialists believe that all people should own the wealth of the world and create a great commonwealth. The Christian believes that God owns the world and that man is merely the custodian, the steward of its wealth, and that everything belongs to God. “The earth is the Lord’s, and the fullness thereof.” When we give something to God, we’re like the little boy who says to his father, “Daddy, give me some money to buy you a present.”

The ancient Jews gave God the first and the best of what they had. The best of the oil, the best of the wine, and the first-fruits of their crops were set aside for God. The animals set aside for sacrifice had to be of the finest quality. God deserves our very best-not what is left over after we have spent everything on ourselves.

Because everything we have belongs to God we cannot really “give” God anything. We can only share with Him what is His in the first place. As Dag Hammarskjold wrote in his book *Markings*:

“In the last analysis, what does the word ‘sacrifice’ mean? Or even the word ‘gift’?
He who has nothing can give nothing. The gift is God’s-to God.”

Many of the ancient Greek coins have an owl engraved on them. The owl was there to remind people that they ought to be as wise as owls in the way they spend their money.

Wise Christian parents will ask their children to make two columns on a piece of paper. Column number 1 will be entitled WHAT ARE WE LIVING FOR? and column number 2 will be called WHAT ARE WE SPENDING FOR? We can never determine wisely what we shall spend our money for until we realize what we are living for. What we are living for will determine whether we spend more in one month for dog food than we give to God. If Jesus is really our Lord and God, it will show in what we give each week for the support of His work through the Church.

Read together Mark 12:41-44.

The widow gave all she had and Jesus praised her. She gave sacrificially. “I will not offer unto the Lord my God that which doth cost me nothing” (2 Sam. 24:24). The widow, twice-afflicted, deprived of a breadwinner, poverty-stricken, held in her hands two copper coins which make one penny. Into the temple treasury went both coins. She could have kept one for herself but she didn't. Christ's verdict was that she had given more than all the rest. “For they all contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had.”

THE EPISTLE

*Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior.
 For He hath regarded the humility of His servant.*
The Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Hebrews. (7:7-17)

Brethren, it is beyond dispute that the inferior is blessed by the superior. Here tithes are received by mortal men; there, by one of whom it is testified that he lives. One might even say that Levi himself, who receives tithes, paid tithes through Abraham, for he was still in the loins of his ancestor when Melchizedek met him. Now if perfection had been attainable through the Levitical priesthood (for under it the people received the law), what further need would there have been for another priest to arise after the order of Melchizedek, rather than one named after the order of Aaron? For when there is a change in the priesthood, there is necessarily a change in the law as well. For the one of whom these things are spoken belonged to another tribe, from which no one has ever served at the altar. For it is evident that our Lord was descended from Judah, and in connection with that tribe Moses said nothing about priests. This becomes even more evident when another priest arises in the likeness of Melchizedek, who has become a priest, not according to a legal requirement concerning bodily descent but by the power of an indestructible life. For it is witnessed of him, "Thou art a priest forever, after the order of Melchizedek."

THE GOSPEL

The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Luke. (2:22-40)

In those days, the parents of Jesus brought Him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every male that opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord"), and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, looking for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. And inspired by the Spirit he came into the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the law, he took Him up in his arms and blessed God and said, "Lord, now lettest thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word; for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation, which Thou hast prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to Thy people Israel." And His father and his mother marveled at what was said about Him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary His mother, "Behold, this child is set for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is spoken against (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), that thoughts out of many hearts may be revealed." And there was a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher; she was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years from her virginity, and as a widow until she was eighty-four. She did not depart from the temple, worshiping with fasting and prayer night and day. And coming up at that very hour she gave thanks to God, and spoke of Him to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. And when they had performed everything according to the law of the Lord, they returned into Galilee, to their own city, Nazareth. And the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon Him.

Commemorations

Orthodox Christians
 Faithful Orthodox fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when they receive Holy Communion in fulfillment of Christ's command to eat His Body and drink His Blood. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, communicants should not be conscious of grave sin, have fasted from the night before taking communion, and seek to live in charity and love with their neighbors. Persons conscious of grave sin must first be reconciled with God and the Church through the Sacrament of Penance (Confession and Absolution). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

Non-Orthodox
 We welcome to this celebration of the Eucharist those Christians who are not fully united with us. It is a consequence of the sad divisions in Christianity that we cannot extend to them a general invitation to receive Communion. Orthodox believe that the Eucharist is an action of the celebrating community signifying a oneness in faith, life, and worship of the community. Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, and for which we must all pray.

Not Receiving Communion
 Those not receiving sacramental communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another by receiving a piece of blessed bread following the dismissal prayers.

Welcome to Ss. Peter and Paul
 To encourage our worship in a proper spirit of prayer and devotion, we respectfully ask you to enter the sanctuary quietly during the Divine Liturgy.

PLEASE DO NOT ENTER OR EXIT THE SANCTUARY AS
 - the clergy censures the sanctuary
 - the congregation is standing, or
 - during the Little Entrance with the Gospel
 - during the Reading of the Epistle and the Gospel
 - Please enter the sanctuary upon the completion of the sermon
 - the Great Entrance with the Holy Gifts
 - the Prayers of Consecration p. 112-113
 - the Hymn to the Theotokos "It is Truly Meet"

Please follow the directions of the ushers during Communion and dismissal; refrain from using cell phones in the narthex; and be considerate of those praying and converse in the hall, outside or downstairs.
