

Orthodox Christians

Faithful Orthodox fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when they receive Holy Communion in fulfillment of Christ's command to eat His Body and drink His Blood. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, communicants should not be conscious of grave sin, have fasted from the night before taking communion, and seek to live in charity and love with their neighbors. Persons conscious of grave sin must first be reconciled with God and the Church through the Sacrament of Penance (Confession and Absolution). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

Non-Orthodox

We welcome to this celebration of the Eucharist those Christians who are not fully united with us. It is a consequence of the sad divisions in Christianity that we cannot extend to them a general invitation to receive Communion. Orthodox believe that the Eucharist is an action of the celebrating community signifying a oneness in faith, life, and worship of the community. Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, and for which we must all pray.

Not Receiving Communion

Those not receiving sacramental communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another by receiving a piece of blessed bread following the dismissal prayers.

CATECHISM

HAVING THIS AS AN ANCHOR OF HOPE Reflections on the Attitude of a Christian Fr. Isaac Crow

What's in an attitude? In an age of uneasy relativism, attitudes often reflect transient ideas and ideologies characterized by constant change and an ambiguity of the individual. For the Christian, however, an attitude may embody and incarnate the whole of life itself, or at least the potential for a connection with the Source of life. This connection is what defines the Christian life as a mystery, that is, a sacramental Communion with God manifest in the attitudes of faith.

One of the cornerstones of the Christian life is hope. Indeed, hope is a primary attitude of faith. Hope itself is an elusive word or notion. In everyday language it refers to "an expectation" or a desire for a future occurrence. For the Christian, hope is a much richer expression, full of the reality of man's connectedness to God. As a primary attitude of the Christian life, hope is tied to the mystery of faith and its fruit; love. As an essential theme of St. Paul's teaching, we find these three notions linked and bound together; consecutive and contingent. "So faith, hope, love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love." ~1 Cor. 13:13 Abiding and orienting himself in the constant work of faith, the Christian seeks through a steadfastness of hope, the greatest grace of all: participation in the source of love. The work of a Christian thus involves a great task. The Christian is called back to the kingdom of God, through a sacrificial journey which must be freely chosen and consciously enacted, day by day and breath by breath. As a created being he is subject to the gravity of this world, and to the burden of his own participation in it, binding him to the reality of his distance from God in sin, suffering, forgetfulness, and death. But man is also created a "Royal Being," bearing within himself the image of God and freely given the potential of his own

God and freely given the potential of his own redemptive return to God in the acquisition of the Divine likeness. It is in this light that the Christian is the inheritor of a great responsibility but also of a great and glorious hope.

The Christian lives and dies as part of a community. This "communal assembly" is the whole body of God's human creation of which the individual is but a component and integral part.

The basic Ecclesial arena of man's life in community forms a foundation of the Christian faith. Man belongs to God, and in the Church he shares in the Living Body of the Lord Himself. In the Church the human, social and historical levels of man's existence are fused and joined to a new life becoming part of the very life of God. At the center of this encounter lies the Cross and the reality of the Incarnation. The Cross itself reflects also the mercy of God who has opened up for man a meeting place wherein everything "on earth" will be "as it is in heaven." The Church lives and moves in this time and place and in response to the event of God's merciful offering. Christ is given, offered and received. The collective life of the Christian is movement of this acceptance, both human and Divine, according to the grace of God through His Son and by the action and presence of the Holy Spirit. In fact, we can bluntly say that for all of us, there is only ONE THING - not ONE HUNDRED - that we must do before we die: BE IN COMPLETE COMMUNION WITH OUR LORD, JESUS CHRIST.

Because of our life's potential brevity, it is essential to live it properly each and every day. What constitutes "living our days like we should?" Every day must be one of service to Christ, His Church and our fellow man. Every day must be viewed as an opportunity to practice the Gospel and share it with others. And yes, every day must be lived as if it were our last.

When all is said and done, I hardly think the Lord will ask us on Judgment Day if we ever went to the Grand Canyon or if we visited the Taj Mahal. However, He will want to know if our "Top 100" included ministering to the poor, the needy, the sick and the imprisoned. If we are most concerned about following Christ and living according to His teachings, our ultimate journey will lead us to the Kingdom of Heaven - which should be first on anyone's list of things to do and places to see!
