

On this day we commemorate: Hieromartyr Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna; Venerable Gorgonia, sister of Gregory the Theologian; Venerable Zebinas, Polychronios, Moses and Damian near Cyrrhus in Syria; Venerable Damian of Esphigmenou monastery on Mount AthoS

RESURRECTIONAL APOLYTIKION (Tone 2)

When Thou didst submit Thyself unto death, O Thou deathless and immortal One, then Thou didst destroy hell with Thy Godly power. And when Thou didst raise the dead from beneath the earth, all the powers of Heaven did cry aloud unto Thee: O Christ, Thou giver of life, glory to Thee.

TROPARION of Ss. Peter & Paul (Tone 4)

O foremost in the ranks of Apostles, and teachers of the world, Peter and Paul, intercede with the Master of all to grant safety to the world and to our souls the great mercy.

KONTAKION for Sunday of Last Judgment (Tone 1)

THE EPISTLE (For Sunday of the Last Judgment)

The Lord is my strength and my praise. The Lord chastising hath chastised me, but He hath not delivered me over to death.

The Reading from the First Epistle of St. Paul to the Corinthians. (8:8-9:2)

Brethren, food will not commend us to God. We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. Only take care, lest this liberty of yours somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if any one sees you—a man of knowledge—at table in an idol's temple, might he not be encouraged, if his conscience is weak, to eat food offered to idols? And so by your knowledge this weak man is destroyed, the brother for whom Christ died. Thus, sinning against your brethren and wounding their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of my brother's falling, I will never eat meat, lest I cause my brother to fall. Am I not free? Am I not an apostle? Have I not seen Jesus our Lord? Are not you my workmanship in the Lord? If to others I am not an apostle, at least I am to you; for you are the seal of my apostleship in the Lord.

THE GOSPEL Matthew. (25:31-46)

The Lord said, "When the Son of man comes in His glory, and all the angels with Him, then He will sit on His glorious throne. Before Him will be gathered all the nations, and He will separate them one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and He will place the sheep at His right hand, but the goats at the left. Then the King will say to those at His right hand, 'Come, O blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave Me food, I was thirsty and you gave Me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed Me, I was naked and you clothed Me, I was sick and you visited Me, I was in prison and you came to Me.' Then the righteous will answer Him, 'Lord, when did we see Thee hungry and feed Thee, or thirsty and give Thee drink? And when did we see Thee a stranger and welcome Thee, or naked and clothe Thee? And when did we see Thee sick or in prison and visit Thee?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me.' Then He will say to those at his left hand, 'Depart from Me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave Me no food, I was thirsty and you gave Me no drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome Me, naked and you did not clothe Me, sick and in prison and you did not visit Me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see Thee hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to Thee?' Then He will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it not to one of the least of these, you did it not to Me.' And they will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Orthodox Christians

Faithful Orthodox fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when they receive Holy Communion in fulfillment of Christ's command to eat His Body and drink His Blood. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, communicants should not be conscious of grave sin, have fasted from the night before taking communion, and seek to live in charity and love with their neighbors. Persons conscious of grave sin must first be reconciled with God and the Church through the Sacrament of Penance (Confession and Absolution). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

Non-Orthodox

We welcome to this celebration of the Eucharist those Christians who are not fully united with us. It is a consequence of the sad divisions in Christianity that we cannot extend to them a general invitation to receive Communion. Orthodox believe that the Eucharist is an action of the celebrating community signifying a oneness in faith, life, and worship of the community. Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, and for which we must all pray.

Not Receiving Communion

Those not receiving sacramental communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another by receiving a piece of blessed bread following the dismissal prayers.

THE RIGHT REVEREND BISHOP NICHOLAS



Today we welcome The Right Reverend Bishop NICHOLAS [Ozone]. Bishop NICHOLAS born in Svria, immigrated to the US in 1981, to study and earn degrees in Electrical and Computer Engineering. He has also attended courses and conferences on psychology and human behavior, Bishop NICHOLAS worked for nearly 20 years as a Computer Engineer

representing companies in Sweden, France, England, Germany, Italy, and USA. He has lectured on Electronics Circuitry, Circuit Theory, and Digital Computers at the Wentworth Institute of Technology, Boston, MA. Bishop NICHOLAS holds a Master of Divinity degree and speaks Arabic and English fluently. His second language in Syria was French, and he is versed in Hebrew, Ancient Greek, New Testament Greek, and Modern Greek. Bishop NICHOLAS was ordained to the Holy Diaconate in 2004, and to the Holy Priesthood by His Grace Bishop ANTOUN in 2005. He served at St. Philip Antiochian Orthodox Church, Fort Lauderdale, FL, from 2005 to 2011. He was elevated to the dignity of Archimandrite by His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP in 2010, and consecrated to the bishopric as the Bishop of Brooklyn in 2011. Bishop NICHOLAS resides at the Archdiocese Headquarters, Englewood, NJ, serves the Diocese of New York and Washington DC, and is the Assistant of Metropolitan PHILIP. His name day is December 6 (St. Nicholas the Wonderworker).

ORDINATION OF CHRISTIAN MANASSEH TO THE HOLY DEACONATE

Born in Saudi Arabia (1976) Christian grew up in Lebanon and received a Bachelor of Engineering degree from the American University of Beirut. Christian came to the United States to pursue a Masters in Engineering (1999) from MIT. He began his career working for a software consulting firm, then started a new company with the CEO of that firm, Christian and Zeina Maalouf married (2006). having met when pursuing their doctorates. Christian received a Ph.D. from UCAL (Berkley) (2010) in Civil Systems—a new discipline involving the use of information technology for the enhancement of civil systems and society. In 2009, son George was born and in 2012, the Manasseh's moved to DC to pursue work; Zeina with an international development non-profit organization and Christian to further the operations of his

Christian's involvement in the church has grown over the years. Born into an Orthodox home and baptized in Syria, Christian attended services in Beirut and churches and monasteries in the villages of Mount Lebanon when his family had to flee their home due to the wars in Lebanon. Christian attended churches throughout his years of study in Boston and California where he was mentored and participated in; a deacon program, the St. Stephen's Course, development of presentations of the sacraments, Bible studies, seminars and conventions; served as Treasurer and was active in several Antiochian Church organizations. Zeina previously served as president of OCF at UC Davis, chants and participates in Women's events.

CATECHISM

HAVING THIS AS AN ANCHOR OF HOPE Reflections on the Attitude of a Christian (Part III of III) Fr. Isaac Crow

The hope of a Christian lies then in a series of attitudes, which constitute a human response to a Divine summons. Man is summoned by God to an exacting and irrevocable discipleship in the Divine-human task.

The summons is, at the same time, a revelation to man of: his original relationship to God, his Source (in whose image he is created), and, the hope of 'putting on' the Divine likeness.

Hope then, is the wellspring of a Christian's journey of transformation. In the attitude of Christian hope, human response and Divine grace are joined. Hope is, first of all, an essential grace of God, given or rather placed in the human soul by the Holy Spirit, to strengthen and guide the development of faith. Saint Paul himself refers to this basic notion in a clear and concise manner: "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." ~ Romans 15:13

Hope serves to bring the role of human choice into conformity with the will of God. In this two-fold path of synergetic cooperation, the human will is opened to the mercies of Divine grace. The whole of

the Christian life is grounded here in this common work of God and man.

Following from this cooperative union, hope begins to function as an evangelical grace of the soul. The attitude of Christian hope reaches out to bind the individual to the whole of humanity and to all of creation. Understanding that the kingdom of God is within him, the Christian looks always in in everything for a physical and spiritual balance in order to preserve in life the "bond of peace and unity."

The Church is thus revealed as an anchor of hope wherein, as Saint John Chrysostom says, "the joyful preserve their joy." The Church gathers its children, in this joyful presence to teach them to project attitudes full of this hope and to offer forth praise, gratitude and healing. In this arena of hope the Christian enters into a community and a life unlike any other, a community in which life is transfigured unto the joy and glory of the Kingdom.

CHRIST'S WORDS PAINT A MAJESTIC SCENE

hat profound lessons are contained in the words of Christ on this Meat Fare Sunday before the Great Fast! What a majestic scene is painted as Jesus depicts Judgement Day when He comes in glory and before Him are gathered all nations! There the words of the Lord are proclaimed: "Come, you blessed of My Father," spoken to one group; and then, "Depart from Me," spoken to another group.

It is important to note that Jesus identifies Himself with the hungry, the naked, the sick, the imprisoned, the outcasts of society. Whatever is done for them, the Lord insists, is done to Him. And conversely, whatever people fail to do for these unfortunate and needy ones, they fail to do to Christ. What an indictment this is on society today, with the many hungry, homeless, the sick of body and spirit, the refugee in strange places, who seek help and care.

There is an old story told about St. John Chrysostom, the great Patriarch of Constantinople. Some people once came to him asking to see the rich gold altar of the magnificent Church of Holy Wisdom. He is said to have taken them to the street, pointed out the hungry, the homeless, the needy of the city and said: "Behold, the altar on which you may bring sacrifice and offering to God!"

Another important aspect of the Gospel narrative is the identity of those in need. Nationality plays no part. Creed and color are not mentioned. What matters is need. What matters is the response of people to that need.

As we draw near to the Great Fast, we have our Lord's instruction for us. This is a time of renewal, of repentance, of commitment to Christ and Church and of rededication to the teachings of our Lord.
