

First Sunday of Great Lent (Sunday of Orthodoxy) & The Holy and Great Forty Martyrs of Sebastia

Divine Liturgy of St. Basil the Great

RESURRECTIONAL APOLYTIKION (Tone 4)

Having learned the joyful message of the Resurrection from the angel the women disciples of the Lord cast from them their parental condemnation. And proudly broke the news to the Disciples, saying: Death hath been spoiled; Christ God is risen, granting the world Great Mercy.

APOLYTIKION of the first Sunday of Great Lent (Tone 2)

Thy pure image do we venerate, O good One, asking forgiveness of our sins, O Christ our God; for by Thine own will Thou didst ascend the Cross in Thy body, to save Thy creatures from the bondage of the enemy. Thou hast verily filled all with joy, since Thou didst come, O our Savior, to save the world.

APOLYTIKION of the fortymartyrs of Sebastia (Tone 1)

Be Thou entreated for the sake of the sufferings of Thy Saints which they endured for Thee, O Lord, and do Thou heal all our pains, we pray, O Lover of mankind.

TROPARION of Ss. Peter & Paul (Tone 4)

O foremost in the ranks of Apostles, and teachers of the world, Peter and Paul, intercede with the Master of all to grant safety to the world and to our souls the great mercy.

KONTAKION for the Annunciation (and Great Lent) (Tone 8)

To thee, the Champion Leader, do I offer thanks of victory, O Theotokos, thou who hast delivered me from terror; but as thou that hast that power invincible, O Theotokos, thou alone can set me free: from all forms of danger free me and deliver me, that I may cry unto thee: "Hail, O Bride without Bridegroom."

THE EPISTLE ((For the Forty Martyrs of Sebastia)

Thou, O Lord, will preserve us and keep us from this generation. Save me, O Lord, for the godly man hath disappeared.

The Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Hebrews. (12:1-10)

Brethren, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and sin which clings so closely; and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus: the Pioneer and Perfecter of our faith. Who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider Him Who endured from sinners such hostility against Himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted. In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding your blood. And have you forgotten the exhortation which addresses you as sons? "My son: do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor lose courage when you are punished by Him; for the Lord disciplines him whom He loves, and chastises every son whom He receives." It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons; for what son is there whom his father does not discipline? If you are left without discipline, in which all have participated, then you are illegitimate children and not sons. Besides this, we have had earthly fathers to discipline us and we respected them. Shall we not much more be subject to the Father?

THE GOSPEL

(For the First Sunday of Great Lent) St. John. (1:43-51)

At that time, Jesus decided to go to Galilee. And He found Philip and said to him, "Follow Me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael, and said to him, "We have found Him of Whom Moses in the Law and also the Prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." Jesus saw Nathanael coming to Him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile!" Nathanael said to Jesus, "How do you know me?" Jesus answered him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." Nathanael answered Him, "Rabbi, Thou art the Son of God! Thou art the King of Israel!" Jesus answered him, "Because I said to you, I saw you under the fig tree, do you believe? You shall see greater things than these." And Jesus said to him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man."

Faithful Orthodox fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when they receive Holy Communion in fulfillment of Christ's command to eat His Body and drink His Blood. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, communicants should not be conscious of grave sin, have fasted from the night before taking communion, and seek to live in charity and love with their neighbors. Persons conscious of grave sin must first be reconciled with God and the Church through the Sacrament of Penance (Confession and Absolution). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all,

Non-Orthodox

We welcome to this celebration of the Eucharist those Christians who are not fully united with us. It is a consequence of the sad divisions in Christianity that we cannot extend to them a general invitation to receive Communion. Orthodox believe that the Eucharist is an action of the celebrating community signifying a oneness in faith, life, and worship of the community. Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, and for which we must all pray.

Not Receiving Communion

Those not receiving sacramental communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another by receiving a piece of blessed bread following the dismissal prayers.

ON STEWARDSHIP

"No one shall appear before the Lord empty-handed, but each of you with as much as he can give, in proportion to the blessings which the Lord God has bestowed on you." ~ Deuteronomy 16:10, 16-17

Mother Teresa tells a story about a very poor family with six children, who had nothing to eat. In fact, her sisters told Mother Teresa that this family hadn't eaten for several days. So Mother Teresa went to visit their home, and brought a big sack of rice. As soon as she gave the sack of rice to the poor family, the mother divided half of the rice and went out the door. She was gone for 10 minutes, and then returned empty-handed. Mother Teresa was surprised to see her leave right away, and asked her, "Where did you go? What did you do?" And the poor mother responded, "And they are hungry. Our neighbors are hungry too. They need food just as much as we do." Later, Mother Teresa commented on this incident, saying, "The greatness of this poor woman was not only that she shared the little food that she had, but, that she NOTICED that her neighbor was in need, and that she wanted to help!" How many of us notice the poor that surround us? How many of us truly see these poor people as people who have names and families, people with unique situations, stories and struggles in their lives? How many of us look at the poor as people created in the divine image of God? And when I talk about the poor, I'm talking about not only the materially poor, but those who feel the poverty of being unloved, unwanted, uncared for; those in our neighborhoods, in our workplaces, even within our own families. AN EXCERPT FROM THE SYNODIKON (CONFESSION OF FAITH) OF THE DAY OF ORTHODOXY

As the prophets beheld, as the Apostles have taught...as the Church has received...as the teachers have dogmatized...as the Universe has agreed...as falsehood has been dissolved... as Wisdom has presented...as Christ Awarded...thus we declare...thus we assert...thus we preach Christ our true God, and honor His Saints in words, in writings, in thoughts, in sacrifices, in churches, in Holy Icons; on the one hand worshipping and reverencing Christ as God and Lord; and on the other hand honoring as true servants of the same Lord of all and accordingly offering them veneration.

This is the Faith of the Apostles, this is the Faith of the Fathers, this is the Faith of the Orthodox, this is the Faith which has established the Universe.

A DAY TO CONTEMPLATE OUR FAITH

e live in a time of tremendous change. Life today is vastly different from what it was a hundred years ago. But in all this world of change, we are reminded today of two things that DO NOT change – OUR FAITH IN JESUS CHRIST AND OUR CHURCH. On this First Sunday of Great Lent, we proclaim to the world of change that we hold the changeless Christian Faith.

This day has a historical basis. Centuries ago a dispute arose in the Church over the place of icons in the faith. The glory of the Eastern Church is the use of these images that not only provide a religious and mystical feeling in an edifice, but are also visual aids – commentaries on sacred history, utilized as channels of communion with the Lord.

In the eighth century, an attempt was made to remove icons from churches. When the matter was finally resolved, THE FIRST SUNDAY OF THE GREAT FAST WAS DESIGNATED AS A DAY FOR THE PROCLAMATION OF THE TRUE FAITH. And so today the faithful of various parishes come together for worship, for procession with icons and for public witness to the ancient Faith of Christ, triumphant over all heresies.

Since we live in a land of many religions, it is vital that testimony be given of the spiritual treasury we hold: The Faith of ancient Christianity, the Faith of the Apostles, the Faith of the Ecumenical Councils, the Faith of the Early Church Fathers, the Faith of the Mother Church of Christendom. As we appreciate our religious heritage today, let us rededicate ourselves to live the Christian Faith in the future.
