ORTHODOX TRADITION AND FAMILY LIFE

The Upbringing of Children

The gospel calls us to feed the hungry and clothe the naked. Apart from the obvious meaning, itself an important element in Christian service, there is also a spiritual meaning. We are to share spiritual nourishment and clothing. This reminds us of St Paul's description of the baptized as those who have 'put on Christ', or who are clothed in Christ (Galatians 3.27). This aspect of caring for children is the most vital part of their upbringing, even more vital than overseeing their physical and psychological development. Again, I stress that the spiritual dimension includes every aspect of the person, down to the question of how they dress and what they eat.

It is the order of priorities that is important for a Christian family. The commandment to love God is the first; thus the first concern is each child's personal relationship with the Absolute, Personal Truth. The Church's pedagogy is based on this foundation. For example, when mother and child are churched forty days after the birth of a baby, the child is dedicated to God in his or her own name. The mother receives back the child, picking it up from the floor of the church. The message of the service is clear: this child is first of all called to be a child of God and co-heir with Christ, the Son of the Father (Romans 8.17). The parents' task is to bring the child up 'in the discipline and instruction of the Lord' (Ephesians 6.4), and to teach him or her how to know God personally.

Knowledge of God is personal. God is personal love, and we can only know him by loving him, which cannot be brought about by constraint. The Eastern Church's doctrine of synergy, which describes how man can freely co-operate with uncreated grace, and how this is what saves man, applies directly to the role of parents. We might use the analogy of fishing, and say with the old proverb: 'Give your son a fish and he will eat well today. Teach him how to use a fishing rod and he will eat well all his life.' Or to take another analogy, from horticulture: those who teach children are not so much occupied with counting flowers on the plants, as with watering their roots.

Freedom does not, of course, mean 'being allowed to do what you feel like'. This misunderstanding of freedom prevails in Western culture, and leads, visibly, to slavery to selfish passions, to the idea that I have a right to something if I desire it. Freedom really means our human capacity to determine, by the use of our own will, our destiny. In our daily life, this implies our potential to discern right from wrong and to fulfil what is right. In this God-given human attribute, man's person, or *hypostasis*, is akin to God.

Those who are truly free are those who love. A primary task of parents is to teach love, and love is learned more easily by those who have the experience of being loved. 'Nothing so furthers teaching as this: loving and being loved', said that wonderful pedagogical guide, St John Chrysostom (Homily 6). To do the best one can for one's children means to foster as well as one is able their growth in likeness to God. This is not simply a pious duty; Christian parents are called to be fellow-workers with God in the creation and formation of new persons, new sons and daughters of God. Personhood in the fullest sense belongs to the saints; they are the most truly human beings. A lesser aim for the children in a Christian family would ignore the most vital elements of reality both human and divine.

THE EPISTLE

(For St. James)

His voice has gone out into all the earth. The heavens declare the glory of God. The Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Galatians. (1:11-19)

Brethren, I would have you know that the Gospel which was preached by me is not man's gospel. For I did not receive it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through a revelation of Jesus Christ. For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the Church of God violently and tried to destroy it; and I advanced in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people; so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers. But when He Who had set me apart before I was born, and had called me through His grace, was pleased to reveal His Son to me, in order that I might preach Him among the Gentiles, I did not confer with flesh and blood, nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were Apostles before me, but I went away into Arabia; and again I returned to Damascus. Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas, and remained with him fifteen days. But I saw none of the other Apostles except James the Lord's brother.

THE GOSPEL

(For the Sixth Sunday of Luke)

The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Luke. (8:26-39)

At that time, Jesus arrived at the country of the Gadarenes, which is opposite Galilee. And as He stepped out on land, there met Him a man from the city who had demons; for a long time he had worn no clothes, and he lived not in a house but among the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he cried out and fell down before him, and said with a loud voice, "What hast Thou to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beseech Thee, do not torment me." For Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. [For many a time it had seized him; he was kept under guard, and bound with chains and fetters, but he broke the bonds and was driven by the demon into the desert.] Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. And they begged Jesus not to command them to depart into the abyss. Now a large herd of swine was feeding there on the hillside; and they begged Jesus to let them enter these. So He gave them leave. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned. When the herdsmen saw what had happened, they fled, and told it in the city and in the country. Then people went out to see what had happened, and they came to Jesus, and found the man from whom the demons had gone, sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind; and they were afraid. And those who had seen it told them how he who had been possessed with demons was healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gadarenes asked Jesus to depart from them; for they were seized with great fear; so He got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with Jesus; but Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your home, and declare all that God has done for you." And he went away, proclaiming throughout the whole city all that Jesus had done for him.

Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, and for which we must all pray.

Those not receiving sacramental communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another by receiving a piece of blessed bread following the dismissal prayers.
