RESURRECTIONAL APOLYTIKION (Tone 5)

Let us believers praise and worship the Word; coeternal with the Father and the Spirit, born of the Virgin for our salvation. For, He took pleasure in ascending the Cross in the flesh to suffer death; and to raise the dead by His glorious Resurrection.

APOLYTIKION of St. Nektarios of Aegina (Tone 1)

The offspring of Selyvria and the guardian of Aegina, the true friend of virtue who didst appear in the last years, O Nektarios, we faithful honor thee as a Godly servant of Christ, for thou pourest forth healings of every kind for those who piously cry out: Glory to Christ Who hath glorified thee. Glory to Him Who hath made thee wondrous. Glory to Him Who worketh healings for all through thee.

TROPARION of Ss. Peter & Paul (Tone 4)

O foremost in the ranks of Apostles, and teachers of the world, Peter and Paul, intercede with the Master of all to grant safety to the world and to our souls the great mercy.

KONTAKION of Entrance of the Theotokos (Tone 4)

The all-pure temple of the Savior, the most precious bridal chamber and Virgin, the treasure-house of the glory of God, today enters the Temple of the Lord, bringing with her the grace which is in the divine Spirit: whom also the angels of God do celebrate in song; for she is the heavenly tabernacle.

CATECHISM

CHURCH HIERARCHY *Part III (Final)*

There are three ranks of ordination in the Church: bishop, priest and deacon. Bishops are in charge of Church provinces, or dioceses, which are made up of a number of parishes. Priests care for individual parishes and their churches. Deacons assist the priests and the bishops at the Liturgy. Dionysius the Areopagite sees in this threefold gradation a reflection of the threefold structure of the celestial hierarchy, a direct continuation of which is the ecclesiastical hierarchy." According to Dionysius, the light and energy of the Divinity are conveyed by delegation from the higher order of angels to the lower, and from them to the ecclesiastical hierarchy and to the laity.

This threefold hierarchy of bishops, presbyters and deacons has existed in the Church from earliest times, though probably not from the first century. In the letters of the apostles we do not see any clear distinction between bishop and presbyter — the words are often interchangeable: 'This is why I left you in Crete, that you might amend what was defective, and appoint elders (presbyters) in every town as I directed you, if any man is blameless, the husband of one wife, and his children are believers ... For a bishop, as God's steward, must be blameless' (Titus 1:5-6, 7). In apostolic times there was still no distinction between diocese and parish: the Church community, whether it was in Crete, Ephesus or Rome, incorporated all the faithful of that city or country and was a 'local' Church (that is, a Church of that locality).

As the Church expanded, however, a need arose for senior presbyters in charge of the communities in a single province and possessing the right to ordain presbyters for them. As early as the second century, Ignatius of Antioch clearly refers to the bishop as the head of the Church and the presbyters as his concelibrants, of one mind with him and obedient to him: The presbyters are in harmony with the bishop as the strings of a lyre. By submitting themselves to the bishop, the presbyters submit to Christ himself. For St Ignatius, the bishop embodies the plenitude of the Church, so that to be out of harmony with him constitutes a break away from the Church. The threefold hierarchy is to be treated with the greatest respect on the part of the faithful: All must respect the deacons as Christ's commandments and the bishops as Jesus Christ himself ... the presbyters are

to be respected as the assembly of God, as the host of angels. Without them there is no Church.

The Church teaches that the moral imperfection of the celebrant in no way affects the validity of the sacraments, for when the priest celebrates the services he is simply an instrument of God. It is Christ himself who baptises; it is he who offers the Eucharist and gives Communion to the people; it is he who absolves sins in the sacrament of Confession. In Confession the priest says to the penitent, 'Behold, Christ stands here invisibly and receives your confession ... and I am but a witness, bearing testimony before him of all things which you have said to me: However, if Christ in his infinite mercy tolerates sinful servants of the Church as he tolerated Judas among the apostles, this in no way justifies ministers of the Church who are unworthy of their vocation. The sins and vices of the clergy have always been a sickness within the Church. They undermine her authority in the eyes of the people and destroy their faith in God, even though they do not affect the validity of the sacraments. God is judged above all by the actions of his servants, for they are the image of Christ in the Church. It is indeed demoralising to see in a priest indifference instead of compassion, disdain instead of love, depravity instead of moral purity, hypocrisy instead of sincerity. A priest wears on his breast a cross bearing an image of Christ crucified for humanity. He is therefore expected to show the same compassion and love as Christ himself showed. 'Set the believers an example in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity', says St Paul to the newly ordained Timothy (I Tim. 4:12).

THE EPISTLE (For St. Nektarios)

The Saints shall boast in glory. Sing unto the Lord a new song.

The Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Ephesians. (5:8-19)

Brethren, walk as children of light (for the fruit of light is found in all that is good and right and true), and try to learn what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them. For it is a shame even to speak of the things that they do in secret; but when anything is exposed by the light it becomes visible, for anything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it is said, "Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give you light." Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise men but as wise, making the most of the time, because the days are evil. Therefore, do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart.

THE GOSPEL (For the Seventh Sunday of Luke)

The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Luke. (8:41-56)

At that time, there came to Jesus a man named Jairus, who was a ruler of the synagogue; and falling at Jesus' feet, he besought Him to come to his house, for he had an only daughter, about twelve years of age, and she was dying. As Jesus went, the people pressed round Him. And a woman, who had had a flow of blood for twelve years, and had spent all her living upon physicians, and could not be healed by anyone, came up behind Him, and touched the fringe of His garment; and immediately her flow of blood ceased. And Jesus said, "Who was it that touched Me?" When all denied it, Peter said, "Master, the multitudes surround Thee and press upon Thee! And Thou sayest, 'Who touched Me?'" But Jesus said, "Someone touched Me; for I perceive that power has gone forth from Me." And when the woman saw that she was not hidden, she came trembling, and falling down before Him declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched Him, and how she had been immediately healed. And Jesus said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace." While Jesus was still speaking, a man from the ruler's house came and said, "Your daughter is dead; do not trouble the Teacher anymore." But Jesus on hearing this answered him, "Do not fear; only believe, and she shall be well." And when Jesus came to the house, He permitted no one to enter with Him, except Peter and James and John, and the father and mother of the child. And all were weeping and bewailing her; but Jesus said, "Do not weep; for she is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. But taking her by the hand Jesus called, saying, "Child, arise." And her spirit returned, and she got up at once; and Jesus directed that something should be given her to eat. And her parents were amazed; but He charged them to tell no one what had happened.

Orthodox Christians

Faithful Orthodox fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when they receive Holy Communion in fulfillment of Christ's command to eat His Body and drink His Blood. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, communicants should not be conscious of grave sin, have fasted from the night before taking communion, and seek to live in charity and love with their neighbors. Persons conscious of grave sin must first be reconciled with God and the Church through the Sacrament of Penance (Confession and Absolution). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

Non-Orthodox

We welcome to this celebration of the Eucharist those Christians who are not fully united with us. It is a consequence of the sad divisions in Christianity that we cannot extend to them a general invitation to receive Communion. Orthodox believe that the Eucharist is an action of the celebrating community signifying a oneness in faith, life, and worship of the community. Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, and for which we must all pray.

Not Receiving Communion

Those not receiving sacramental communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another by receiving a piece of blessed bread following the dismissal prayers.

To encourage our worship in a proper spirit of prayer and devotion, we respectfully ask you enter the sanctuary quietly during the Divine Liturgy.


